## PROJECT SUMMARY "Historicity and Identity" Matthew Maher

My project is an attempt to rethink the practice of History in order to convince my colleagues to incorporate more Japan Studies into the curriculum. My hope is that through a more rigorous understanding of the historical praxis, Japan Studies will be integrated as an essential (and more attractive) addition to courses across disciplines at the Community College of Denver.

Japan Studies offers an opportunity to come not only to a richer understanding of Japanese history and culture, but to understand more about the construction of Identity (as a historical concept). As such, when we (students in the United States) learn about Japan, we are learning about ourselves. This construction informs our behavior, and in turn impacts the possibilities for community and social change.

The Japanese Studies Institute Program provided an almost endless variety of topics and themes that can be applied to virtually all of the social science and humanities courses taught at the Community College of Denver.
